

On Thanksgiving Day we were feeding over 250 people! At one point in the afternoon every chair of the ten plus tables was filled with hungry people. Thank God for the many generous people who cooked turkeys for the dinner, as we needed them all.

There had to be at least seventy five volunteers to cook and serve. Our Confirmation class served. Many volunteers from outside the Church participated, including our friends from ALANON. Younger children of families that served made Thanksgiving cards for our guests. A local celebrity, Kevin Connelly, served and then went out with flyers to bring in more people

One person who stood out was our Administrative Assistant, Chris Saas, who collected dozens of winter coats and blankets to give to our guests, and served food from the kitchen most of the day.

There are still a large number of adult and children's coats available. Please give them to a family that may need them. We want to thank all those who supported this great sharing event.

The Food Ministry, our proposed monthly soup kitchen, is developing well. Barbara Becker, chairperson, has received \$1000 from our own UMW (United Methodist Women)and another \$1000 as seed money from the Presbyterian Church of Rocky Point. Don Kolacki and our friends from the UMC of Bayport cleaned up the leaves at the parsonage. Barry Burrell noticed that the lights along the long outside staircase of Wesley Hall were not working. He cleaned and repainted the protective cages, replaced a broken fixture and installed new bulbs. Steve Rice, on the day before his second knee operation, worked with me to neutralize the rust and recoat an old tinned roof at the parsonage. The old adage that an ounce of prevention is worth a pound of cure is true in preventive maintenance. There are many conditions at the Church and parsonage that need maintenance: rusting handrails, roof recoating, masonry sealing, etc. Most of these we can do ourselves. Ignoring this maintenance will cost us dearly eventually. With the coming of warmer weather, we will be asking for volunteers to fix these conditions.

Our sanctuary was beautiful this Christmas. Under the direction of Geri Sheridan the greens were hung, Poinsettias were placed, and all had a moving Christmas Eve Service. Thanks to all who helped decorate and take down those greens.

Bill Loris has been doing Income Tax returns for Church members for years. He donates half the fee back to our Church. If you are looking for a new "tax man", please call Bill at 286-2695.

The Finance Committee will provide statements for two forms of giving. There are pledges, a commitment for a weekly or monthly amount. There are also non-pledges, where you support the Church with what you can. Envelopes are provided for both.

Our hard working Financial Secretary, Tom Bracken, has a reasonable policy that if you do not have envelopes, then we will not tract your giving or provide statements. We suggest that you give with checks, so you have receipts.

Through this bleak economic time and this busy holiday season, your fidelity to the Church has shown through. You may be looking quizzically at the above heading and wondering, What is a Wesley dinner? I'm glad you asked. Wesley Dinners is the new name of the monthly feeding ministry that our church will begin in

February 2010. We will be serving a free dinner on the 4th Thursday of every month, from 5-6pm, to anyone who would like to dine with us.

The name came about when Kathy Wells and I were discussing what name to use on the program specific checking account— "Soup Kitchen" sounded a little patronizing

and "Feeding Program", in addition to being boring, sounded more like a dietary supplement for horses. So, since John Wesley was always committed to helping those in need, and, since we would like to consider those who enjoy the meals as our guests rather than numbers served, in a rare flash of brilliance, we came up with "Wesley Dinners".

The ministry will be run by the Steering Committee. Thus far, the following positions have been filled: Trudy Mansfield will coordinate all volunteer activities; Carol Kirschner will be responsible for food safety; Steve Shadbolt will coordinate cooking and menus, with the help of Joanne, Courtney, and Brian; Kathy Wells will be treasurer. Temporarily, the responsibilities of the other positions will be shared by the Outreach Committee, BUT, we will shortly need a president, vice president, secretary, fundraising coordinator and fundraising secretary. Any of these positions can be shared.

We begin operations with a bank balance of \$2000: \$1000 from our own UMW; \$1000 from the Rocky Point Presbyterian meal program, whose coordinator, Carol Moor (who is Kathy Loris' mom) has been wonderfully helpful in many ways. Eventually, we hope to link with Long Island Cares and Island Harvest for food and equipment donations. Also, if the Interfaith Nutrition Network (INN) begins accepting new programs, we will apply to them.

Volunteers are the heart of such a program. The more we have to set up, serve, and clean up, on a scheduled basis, the more efficient we will be and the lighter the workload for all. Please talk to Trudy if you would like to help. Also, Carol K. will be scheduling a thorough kitchen cleaning for mid to late January. The more hands, the quicker the work.

This is an exciting ministry, where our faith and our works are joined. A peaceful and joyful new year to all.

# War Touches Our Family Once More

It is Advent, the beginning of the traditional time of year when Christians are reminded of the birth of Jesus and the biblical promise of his Second Coming.

It is a time of anticipation for followers of Christ. Every year, this blessed season arrives in a new context. Times change and our challenges are always evolving. Some things are getting better for the human family. Other things remain the same.

Sometimes the whole Earth seems to groan under the weight of profound human woes.

At a recent worship service, the following words were part of my prayer with the congregation:

"Again this year, as so often in the past, we pray to you, God, against a backdrop of wars and conflicts in this world. Prince of Peace, Lord, raise up and empower wise peacemakers. Grant, O God, that we will waste no more human lives on the altar of human sin, arrogance, ambition and pride. Make us learn to pour our resources into the advancement of civilization rather than into the pockets of those who profit off conflict and human misery."

This is an especially poignant time for our family. Our oldest grandson, John White, completes his U.S. Army basic training at Fort Benning, Ga. He will spend a brief time in Germany. Then he will be deployed to Afghanistan. We now join those other families whose daily prayers will intensify immensely.

It is a relatively small group of Americans touched so directly by war this Christmas. Most of us read the news with a generalized detachment and a shrug: "It doesn't much affect us." But for we few who have loved ones at risk, a different emotion applies.

Our family has a long history of military service to America, in every war dating back to the Revolutionary War. In the Civil War, ours, like many others, was a divided family. Most of our ancestors were in the Union Army, but some served in the Confederate Army. One of our grandfathers died in a Confederate prison camp.

When the nation called, our family has been quick to answer. We honor the men and women from our family who have served and continue to serve.

Still, I detest war.

Those who cause wars to arise violate most of the Ten Commandments and most of the principles of civilized behavior. So often the origins of war are found in aggressive ambitions against neighbors. Greed and covetousness power the conflicts. The urge to control others is a motivating force. The list goes on and on: racial and cultural enmity, national arrogance, religious pride, ignorance, bigotry, hate.

So, we yearn for the Prince of Peace in this Advent and Christmas season to do his work in this world. We want no more families to suffer the grief of the loss of a son or daughter to war. We want no more loss of innocent people at the hands of murderous barbarians. We want all people to sleep in safety. We want children to be healthy and well fed, educated and happy. We want old people to be at ease in their final years. We want justice and peace for everyone.

We love our John. He is dear to our hearts. We are proud of him. And we pray for him and all others who follow a sense of duty into the service of peace. We pray that God will protect them and that they will always be on the side of what is right and just in this world.
