Then it came time for the collection. Four big men walk down the aisle to get wooden offertory plates and proceed back up the aisle to collect. The boy has nothing and feels ashamed. Then something moved him inside (LOVE). He runs up the aisle yelling “put down the plate”, so the usher rests it on the floor, and the boy jumps into the plate and says “pick it up now”. He shouts “Jesus, I’ve no money but take me to be your faithful servant”. (HOPE at work)

In our troubled times, let us remember to pray for our country and service men and women, our church and Rev. Chung and community of faith (us) and Thank God for giving us His son.

## Finances

The financial problems of our church have been building for many years as giving has declined while expenses have increased.

You’ve heard this before: For the past several years, funds have been withdrawn from our endowment account to pay our bills. Right now, with about \$25,000 remaining in our endowment, we have unpaid bills for Property Insurance and Pastor’s Pension and Health Insurance that, by year end will total about \$20,000. These must be paid. We also have about \$21,000 in unpaid Conference Apportionments. In the past, our church was able to pay these connectional funds 100%. We will not be able to do that this year, but we will need to pay part of it.

Trustees have some funds, but not a lot, and Trustee money is needed for repairs and maintenance on our buildings. An urgent roof repair (there’s a leak) at the parsonage will cost about \$3000.

If anybody has any magic solutions, we’d like to hear them, but as of right now it looks like we will be very nearly depleting our funds to get through the year.

November is the month that we receive Giving Pledges. Nobody likes to be asked for money even in the best of times and now is not good. But, to keep our doors open, we need revenue. Please prayerfully consider your giving. Remember that giving can be charged to a MasterCard or Visa card or deducted from a bank account automatically each month. You can make arrangements by calling the office.

Dear United Methodists of the New York Area:

Greetings to you in the name of our Lord and Savior, Jesus Christ!

Not since the Great Depression has the world economy experienced such turmoil and uncertainty as it has recently. All around us there is confusion, fear, anxiety, depression and anger. Economic stresses are affecting our families profoundly. Many people in our churches are suffering real pain. Not least, the poorest among us who know suffering on a daily basis are rendered even more vulnerable to shrinking financial resources, opportunities and compassion. And then there are those who live in extreme poverty. The plight of those who make up half of the world’s population, living on less than two dollars a day, is the bleakest of all as the world economic downturn will inevitably impact their lives most severely.

As people of faith, this is the time for holy boldness with holy imagination. Now is not the time to hold on in fear, but the time to give witness that our God cares. Now is not the time to shrink from the scare of scarcity, but to open our arms to the hurting people in our community and the world in witness to the abundance of God’s love and compassion. Now is not the time to turn inward, but the time to reach out and touch lives with the good news of the reign of God. As the feast of indulgence of Wall Street is over, let the feast of the kingdom of God flourish. Jesus said: *...one’s life does not consist in the abundance of possessions* (Luke 12:15) *....seek first God’s kingdom and God’s righteousness* (Matthew 6:33).

God is our help in ages past, our hope for years to come, our shelter from the stormy blast, and our eternal home. Indeed, the steadfastness of God’s love and faithfulness towards us endures forever. Though the mountains shake, waters roam and foam, nations rage and kingdoms totter, the God who is our refuge and strength, a very present help in trouble (Psalm 46:1) is with us. Our God, who is concerned about the wellbeing of God’s children more than anyone else, is ever close to us in this time of trial.

I pray that our people will find compassion and comfort, strength and courage, faith and hope in the vision and values of God’s kingdom in our church for such a time as this.

## UMC.Org Reviews: *Traitor*

Director: Jeffrey Nachmanoff;

UMC.org—There are few words with a more negative and damaging connotation than traitor. Judas Iscariot and Benedict Arnold were both traitors whose very names have become synonymous with the betrayal of a sacred trust. In the complex and thought provoking new espionage thriller, *Traitor*, Don Cheadle plays a human mystery, a man whose loyalties and motives are veiled by intentional deception and who is hopelessly torn between God and country. The film explores the nature of loyalty, the perversion of faith and the question of acceptable losses. And to top it off, our hero—who may or may not be on a mission to root out Muslim terrorists—is himself a devout Muslim.

Academy Award nominee Don Cheadle (*Hotel Rwanda*, *Crash*) and Guy Pearce (*Memento*, *L.A. Confidential*) deftly spar in *Traitor*, a taut and largely plausible espionage thriller of international spy versus spy, where the line between the “good guys” and the “bad guys” is blurred and all motives are driven by an understandable (if not sympathetic) point of view. In a story packed with the unexpected, it is equally surprising that the idea for the story comes from comedian Steve

Martin, who is also credited as the film's Executive Producer.

Cheadle plays Samir Horn, a Muslim born in Sudan, who is an undercover operative for a shadowy U.S. intelligence agency. At the age of 12, Horn witnessed the death of his father in a terrorist car bombing in Sudan—an early indoctrination into the world of violent treachery. Fleeing to America with his mother, the young man learned to love his new country while never giving up his Sudanese roots or Muslim faith.

In the opening scene, Horn is caught in an FBI ambush while trying to sell detonators to a group of international terrorists in Yemen. Although the FBI—led by smooth, philosophical agent Roy Clayton (Pearce)—have no jurisdiction in Yemen, they imprison Horn in a local jail and hold his fate in their hands. Surprisingly, Horn refuses to cooperate, and in so doing, gains the trust of the suspicious terrorists captured with him. When they are released, the terrorists reveal their plot to stage a massive suicide bombing attack across America. A man without a county or an identity, Horn finds himself pulled ever deeper into their conspiracy. Where exactly do his loyalties lie? Is his own life worth saving as he becomes more and more involved and gets innocent blood on his hands?

*Traitor* is a film that requires viewers to have an open mind and to consider complex questions. Terrorists are not portrayed as simple black and white characters, but rather as passionate human beings driven by deep beliefs. We are asked to consider whether their grievances are understandable—even if their methods are unforgivable. The film also acknowledges the gulf between the pure tenets of a religion—

including Islam and Christianity—and the actions of many who profess it. Clayton illustrates this by recounting events from his childhood in the Deep South when Klan members—supposed Christians—would burn a cross on someone's lawn at night. His father, a pastor, and his congregation would go out the next morning to remove the burned cross and comfort the terrorized family.

In this convoluted story, the most intriguing aspect is the depth and complexity with which the characters are portrayed, particularly Horn and Clayton. Horn opposes Muslim terrorists, not because he is a naturalized American or a Christian, but because he is a devout Muslim and sees killing innocents as a perversion of true Islam. Clayton, on the other hand, is a Baptist minister's son with a degree in Middle Eastern studies. Although he is Christian and American, Clayton is drawn to Horn as a kindred spirit with a similar sense of ethics.

*Traitor* asks us to question stereotypes, to look at other faiths with fresh eyes and to question the compatibility of killing with a religion that preaches love. For example, we are asked to consider difficult questions like what are “acceptable losses” and whether a largely innocent populace can be held accountable for the actions of their leaders. Applied to us, *Traitor* is really a film about loyalty. Though most of us never do anything that approaches traitorous, we can all search our souls about the idea of loyalty. Where do our loyalties lie? To whom do you owe allegiance—family or country? When Clayton asks Horn where his loyalties lie, he answers, “With God.” Makes you think.
